<p><b>1900</b> The Horticulturalist's Cottage was remodeled and refurbished for classes in domestic science, and from then until 1908 it was known as the Domestic Science Cottage – a humble beginning for the later-day School of Home Economics.</p> 	<p><b>1913</b> Domestic Science was named The Department of Home Economics and moved to the newly built Agriculture Hall.</p> 	<p><b>1922</b> Students in the Home Economics Dressmaking Class (above) and Millinery Class (left) and Food Laboratory (below).</p> 	<p><b>1934-1949</b> The Department became the School of Home Economics within the University of Arizona College of Agriculture and the enrollment increased by 300 percent.</p> 	<p><b>1955</b> Student enrollment reached over 200 undergraduate majors.</p> 	<p><b>1960's</b> Laboratory sample analysis was one of the most current research techniques.</p> 	<p><b>1970's</b> The University of Arizona School of Home Economics Faculty.</p> 	<p><b>1990's</b> Computer labs became tools for learning.</p> 	<p><b>1999 to Present</b> Dr. Soyeon Shim, Director The School was renamed the School of Family and Consumer Sciences in 2000.</p> 	<p><b>2006</b> Groundbreaking for McClelland Park after the Franklin Building was demolished.</p> 	
<p><b>1907</b> Foods Laboratory in Domestic Science Cottage.</p> 	<p><b>1915</b> A Senior Home Economics Student demonstrating the use of the electric washing machine.</p> 	<p><b>1944</b> Home Economics updated electric food laboratory.</p> 	<p><b>1956-1975</b> Dr. Ruth Hall, Director led the new building project and shaped the future of Home Economics.</p> 	<p><b>1960's</b> Household Equipment Laboratory shows the evolution of appliances.</p> 	<p><b>1984</b> The School of Home Economics was renamed the School of Family and Consumer Resources.</p> 	<p><b>1988</b> The School received approval to offer a Ph.D. degree program. The Council of Alumni and Friends lends support to the school (below right).</p> 	<p><b>1990's to Present</b> Student groups offer leadership, community outreach and professional development opportunities.</p> 	<p><b>2003</b> The Take Charge America Institute for Consumer and Financial Education and Research was established.</p> 	<p><b>2004-2008</b> McClelland Park, the first University of Arizona building ever built with 100% private funds, was dedicated in honor of the McClelland family. Dr. Soyeon Shim, Director, led Campaign Cornerstones with nearly 2,000 supporters raising \$25 million. The Grand Opening and Dedication was celebrated in October 2008.</p> 	
<p><b>2005</b> The Terry J. Lundgren Center for Retailing was created in 1993 to bring together the resources and expertise of academia and the retail industry with a shared goal of developing strong future retail professionals.
