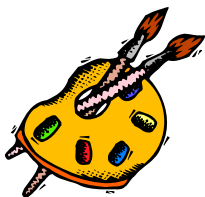

### **NICK OFFERS GRANTS AND FEATURES 4-H MILLION TREES PROJECT ON-AIR**

Nickelodeon is offering grants ranging from \$2,500 to \$5,000 to 10 Green Teams extraordinary youth across the nation that are helping to make smart, eco-friendly changes in their home, school and community. This initiative is a part of the "Big Green Help," an environmental awareness campaign and kid-led movement that provides information and tools to help explain climate change to young people, and connects them to energy-saving and earth-friendly activities in their everyday lives.

Arizona was recently awarded a 4-H2O Replenish Project Grant from National 4-H Council and the Coca-Cola Foundation. The project is aimed at raising awareness and promoting a culture of water conservation through rainwater harvesting demonstration projects and boosting young peoples knowledge and interest in water conservation. As part of the 4-H2O Replenish Project an art contest is being held statewide. The theme is 4-H<sub>2</sub>O and Save the Rain Arizona and is open to all Arizona youth in grades K through 12 during the 2009-2010 school year. ### **JOB OPPORTUNITY**

SCA and the US Fish and Wildlife Service are offering over 45 paid internships for college students and recent graduates from ethnically and culturally diverse backgrounds. Although these internships are designed to provide ethnically and culturally diverse students the opportunity to learn about conservation science, management, and careers through "real world" research, management, and communication projects as an adjunct to academic learning in the lab and classroom, these opportunities are open to all interested candidates.

As an Intern: You will serve for 12 weeks at a US Fish and Wildlife Service Refuge, You will participate in a one week training (in addition to 12 weeks of service) at SCA's National Headquarters in Charlestown, New Hampshire. Interns will receive \$400.00/week, housing will be provided during the duration of the internship, and interns will be reimbursed for travel expenses to and from the internship. Travel expenses related to the one week training will be covered by SCA and the US Fish and Wildlife Service.

Eligibility: Must be a current college student or a graduate that is enrolled in a graduate school for Fall 2009 . Have an interest in conservation, not necessarily a background in hard science.

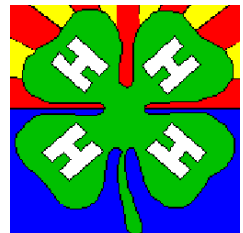

### HIKE THE GRAND CANYON

Every year millions of people visit the Grand Canyon. Most choose to view it from the top. Very few people make the commitment to experience the Grand Canyon from within the canyon walls through day hikes. Fewer still can say that they have slept within the walls of the Grand Canyon or touched the cool waters of the Colorado River. Upon evaluating Apache County 4-H teen opportunities, an idea was formulated that would provide an incredibly unique experience by hiking the trails and camping at the bottom of the Grand Canyon. With personal experience of hiking the Grand Canyon, it is truly an experience that will last a lifetime. The Apache County 4-H teen team will be hiking to the bottom and camping overnight within the walls of the Grand Canyon. Our initial plan is to arrive at or near the Grand Canyon National Park on a Friday evening and campout or stay in a motel, hike to Bright Angel Campground on Saturday, spend the night at the campground, hike out Sunday morning, and return home that afternoon. The potential dates are one of the first two weeks in October. Our preferred weekend (at this point) is **October 9 - 11, 2009**.

The Apache County 4-H teen team is inviting all interested 4-H teen groups throughout Arizona to join with us for an opportunity of a lifetime. Due to strict permitting regulations by the Grand Canyon National Park, each group will need to secure their own backcountry permit. However, there will be many opportunities to gather before, during and after the proposed weekend. There are five areas of learning that have been identified to ensure this opportunity will truly be an educational experience that will be life-changing.

- \* Developing Teen Leadership
- \* Opportunities for Personal Growth
- \* Promoting Health and Physical Activity
- \* Learning Outdoor Educational Skills
- \* Learning of the History and Culture

If you are interested in learning more about the proposed trip or you would like more information about the learning opportunities, please contact **Mike Hauser at (mhauser@Ag.arizona.edu)**. ***A key date to be aware of with regards securing a permit is June 1.*** That is the first (and best) day to apply for a backcountry permit that will allow you to camp in the Grand Canyon in October.

### JUNIOR RECORD BOOKS & SENIOR PORTFOLIOS

You can find information about Record Books & Portfolios on our website. Small Stock, Large Livestock and Equine members are required to submit a completed Junior Record Book or Senior Portfolio. Only those 4-H members completing and submitting these and scoring 60 points will be eligible for state and county fairs, livestock shows, horse finals, awards, trips or scholarships. **This year there will be no second chances on Record Book or Portfolio scores.** To make sure that you will score at least 60 points, ask another member, friend, leader or parent to score your book before turning it in. This will give you a good idea of what your score is and if there are areas that need more work before you turn it in.

**The deadline for submission is: JULY 24, 2009, 5:00 pm in the extension office.**

There is one more record book/portfolio workshop. It will be on Wednesday, May 6<sup>th</sup> from 6:30-8:00 pm at the Maricopa County Extension Office. Please RSVP to Dotty by Monday, May 4<sup>th</sup>.

Dotty will also be offering a half day "help" opportunity for questions and help on Record Books & Portfolios. Please call her for date and times.

Project members other than small livestock, equine and large livestock have the option of submitting a 4-H Summary, but are encouraged to submit a record book or portfolio.

- Potential for practical application to local and area club work
- Relevance to current projects and trends in youth development

**PROPOSALS MAY BE SUBMITTED AS ONE OF FOUR TYPES\*:**

- 90 minute session - hands on learning experiences designed to provide comprehensive coverage of subject matter,
- 45 minute mini-session - introduction or promotional workshop designed to engage learners, but cover less subject matter; mini sessions will be paired in a time slot to allow for consistency in the schedule.
- 2 part session - hands on learning experiences designed to provide comprehensive coverage of subject matter that cannot be covered in one 90 minute session,
- Off site/Educational tour - hands on learning experienced conducted away from the hotel (ex: at a local dairy; food plant; arena; etc.); off site workshops will be allotted two 90 minute sessions to allow for travel.

\*Type of session selected does not guarantee nor hinder your workshop being chosen. Please select the type most conducive to your topic area and objectives. This will assist us in planning a quality conference experience for all participants.

## PRECAUTIONS FOR THE “H1N1 FLU”

**There are everyday actions people can take to stay healthy.**

Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it.

- Wash your hands often with soap and water, especially after you cough or sneeze. Alcohol-based hands cleaners are also effective.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. Germs spread that way.

**Try to avoid close contact with sick people.**

- Influenza is thought to spread mainly person-to-person through coughing or sneezing of infected people.
- If you get sick, CDC recommends that you stay home from work or school and limit contact with others to keep from infecting them.



## AMERICAN HEART ASSOCIATION FIELD TRIP

Maricopa County 4-H members are invited to attend a tour at the Halle Heart Center on June 4th from 10 am to 12 noon. This is a fantastic opportunity to see how a heart works and learn how to keep your heart healthy. The best part about this tour is it's **FREE!** We need at least 15 youth to attend and parents are welcome too. The tour is geared for 8-12 years of age but is appropriate for all ages. Please RSVP to Dotty Spears extension 359 by **June 1st**. The Halle Heart Center is located at 2929 S 48th Street (about 1 mile from our office).

Here are some of the things we will be doing on the tour.

Examine an actual EKG and learn how your heart beat sends out an electrical signal.

**All Creatures Great and Small** Learn how the hearts of various animals are different in size and weight yet all have the same function. You can also view illustrations on animal heart sizes and rates.

**The Chain of Survival** Come and learn the four links to the Chain of Survival. Listen to a real 911 emergency call! Feel the amount of pressure needed to perform CPR on an adult, child, and infant. Understand how an Automated External Defibrillator works by interacting with a model.

**Forewarned About Smoking** Take a turn on the putting green and see how smoking constricts the arteries and reduces blood flow. This makes your heart work harder.

**Basha's Heart Right Supermarket** Select your favorite foods from grocery carts, then check them on our special scanner to learn about the foods place on the food pyramid, its fat content, and how it fits into your daily plan for heart-healthy eating.

**Heart Sick Heart Hope** Understand the diseases of the heart and cardiovascular system, some are congenital and some are cause by life-style choices. Then, learn about the current medical treatments, procedures, surgeries, and technical innovations that offer hope to those with cardiovascular disease.

**911 Sound Stage** Enter the world of a real heart attack victim! This exciting presentation uses lighting, sound, props and video to provide a dramatic reenactment of a real heart attack. You will experience what happens when you call 911 and how CPR can save the life of someone you love. Learn to recognize the warning sign of a heart attack and stroke.

**APS Watts Healthy Electric Cooking Kitchen and Classroom** This cutting-edge kitchen is a cook's dream! Learn how to prepare a healthy snack by making heart healthy food choices and learn about fat content in different foods. Cooking classes and Master Chef presentations are also available through the Halle Heart Center

**Each One Reach One** Visitors can learn how risk factors and warnings signs for heart attack and stroke are different for women. Come and check your height, weight, and body fat percentage.

**Stroke / Brain Attack** Explore our touch screen presentation to understand the risk factors, and different types of stroke. Become familiar with warning signs for stroke.

**Stroke Empathy** - Watch our video filmed through the eyes of someone having a stroke. Examine the huge 6-foot head with anatomically correct brain display to learn more about why stroke is the leading cause of serious disability.

**Solheim Theatre** - Watch a murder mystery, (or a claymation video for our younger audiences) in our state-of-the-art movie theater and learn about risk factors for heart disease.

**The Beat Goes On** See your heartbeat in action! Through a stethoscope, visitors can see their heart beat through kinetic motion of particles. The impact of physical activity on heart rate and how hard the heart beats is clearly demonstrated on the kinetic sculptures. Come and learn the critical role that physical activity plays in reducing the risk of heart disease in all ages.

**In Touch With Your Heart** - See a 6-foot tall model of the heart and hear about how your heart works. Visitors can learn about the circulatory system on a human size exhibit. LubDub coaches you in building a heart on an interactive computer, where you can see the circulatory system in action.

## SAVORY SALADS

Enjoying a salad before a meal takes the edge off your hunger, making it easier to consume smaller amounts of other foods. In addition to calorie control, a 3-cup salad provides three of the recommended 3 to 5 servings of vegetables we need every day.

Salads can be healthful meals, but the some toppings can turn it into a helping of calories and fat. Cheese, croutons, bacon bits, nuts and creamy or oily dressings add up. An average salad bar plate can top out at more than 1,000 calories, depending on choices & portions.

The National Salad Month of May is the perfect time for a salad makeover. A variety of vegetables adds nutrients, flavor, and appeal to your meals. Add more good nutrition—and interest—to your salad with the following hints:

- Visiting a salad bar? Pace yourself. Check out the choices from end to end before you begin making your salad. Use a salad plate, not a dinner plate.
- Start with a base of mixed greens: spinach, Romaine, red leaf, watercress. The darker the green, the more nutrients that lettuce contains.
- Add plenty of bright colors: tomato, broccoli florets, shredded carrots, green or red pepper, beets, green beans, onions, mushrooms, cucumber.
- Make it hearty with 1 or 2 ounces of lean protein: chicken, turkey, tuna, shrimp, tofu, canned beans (rinsed and drained).
- Prefer cheese? Try a small topping of sliced or chopped low-fat cheese.
- Herb it: tarragon, chives, parsley, cilantro, marjoram, even mint freshly chopped boost flavor without adding fat.
- Want to sweeten up? Mandarin orange segments, sliced strawberries, chopped apples, and dried fruit add more vitamins and other nutrients.
- Avoid “fatty” creamy coleslaws, potato & macaroni salads with little fiber or nutrients.

For some people, dressing is the best part. Unfortunately, it’s also loaded with calories. A single tablespoon of vinaigrette is about 50 calories a tablespoon of creamy ranch is about 90 calories. But who stops at a just one tablespoon? One filled small plastic container of dressing yields 4 tablespoons (that means 200 extra calories from vinaigrette and a nearly 360 calories from Ranch), and a second container of Ranch dressing - 720 calories & more than 60 fat grams!

- Dress light, dress well: Select vinaigrette or any low-fat salad dressing, mustard, or citrus juice. Spoon on just one or two teaspoons of dressing, or get a cup on the side and dip each forkful of salad lightly into the dressing.

Finally, keep it safe. The Partnership for Food Safety Education provides these guidelines:

Check that fresh cut fruits and vegetables like packaged salads and precut melons are refrigerated at the store before buying and do not buy fresh cut items that are not refrigerated. Throw away fresh fruits and vegetables that go unrefrigerated within two hours of cutting, peeling or cooking.

Rinse fresh fruits and vegetables under running tap water, including those with skins and rinds that are not eaten. Packaged fruits and vegetables labeled “ready-to-eat,” “washed” or “triple washed” need not be washed. Rub firm-skin fruits and vegetables under running tap water or scrub with a clean vegetable brush while rinsing with running tap water.

Remove and throw away bruised or damaged portions of fruits and vegetables when preparing to cook them or before eating them raw.

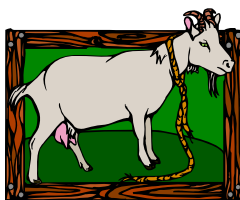

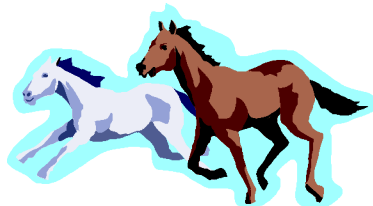
